Currently serve nearly 50,000 students annually



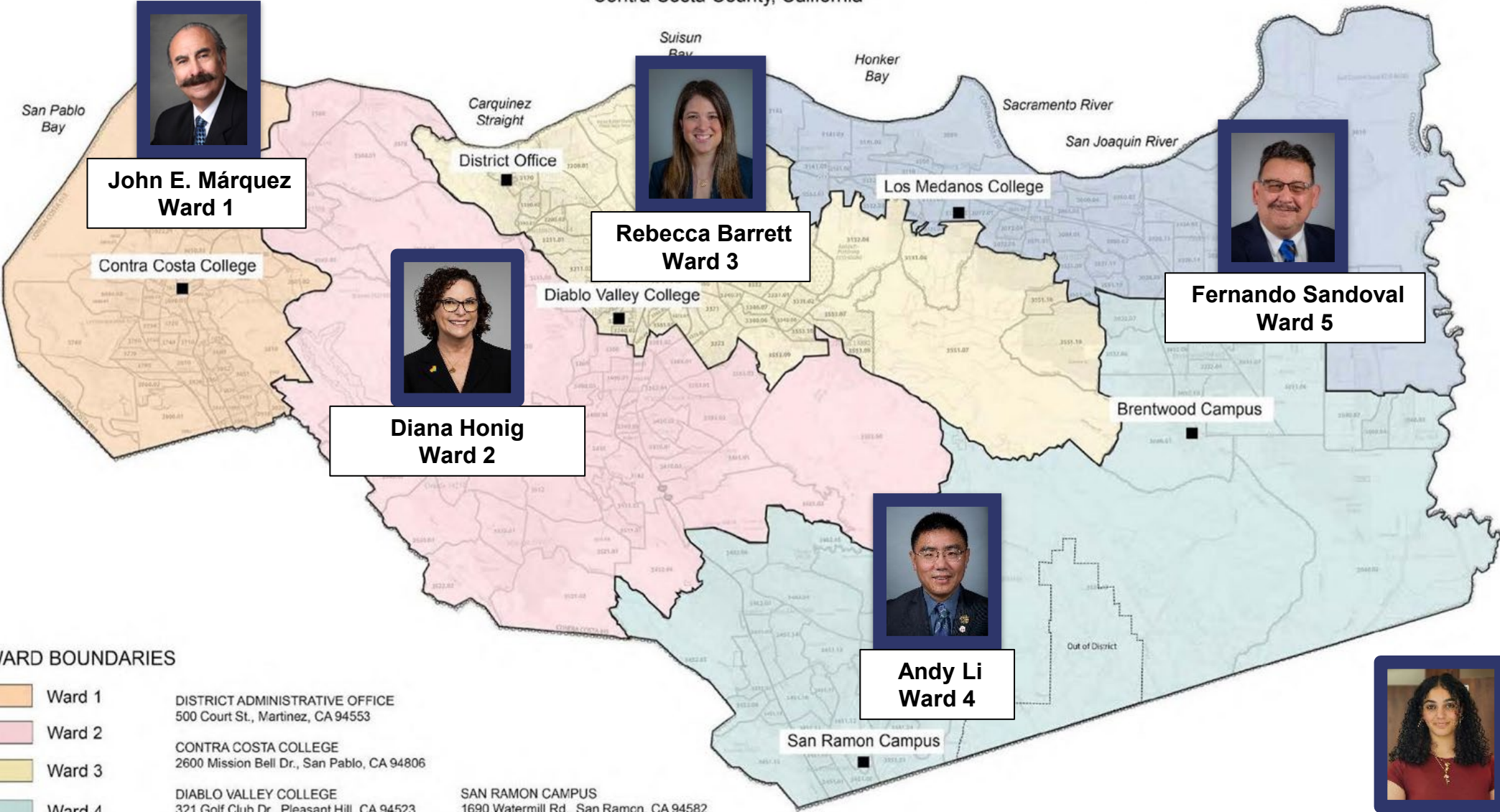
Currently employ nearly 3,400 people

Contra Costa County, California



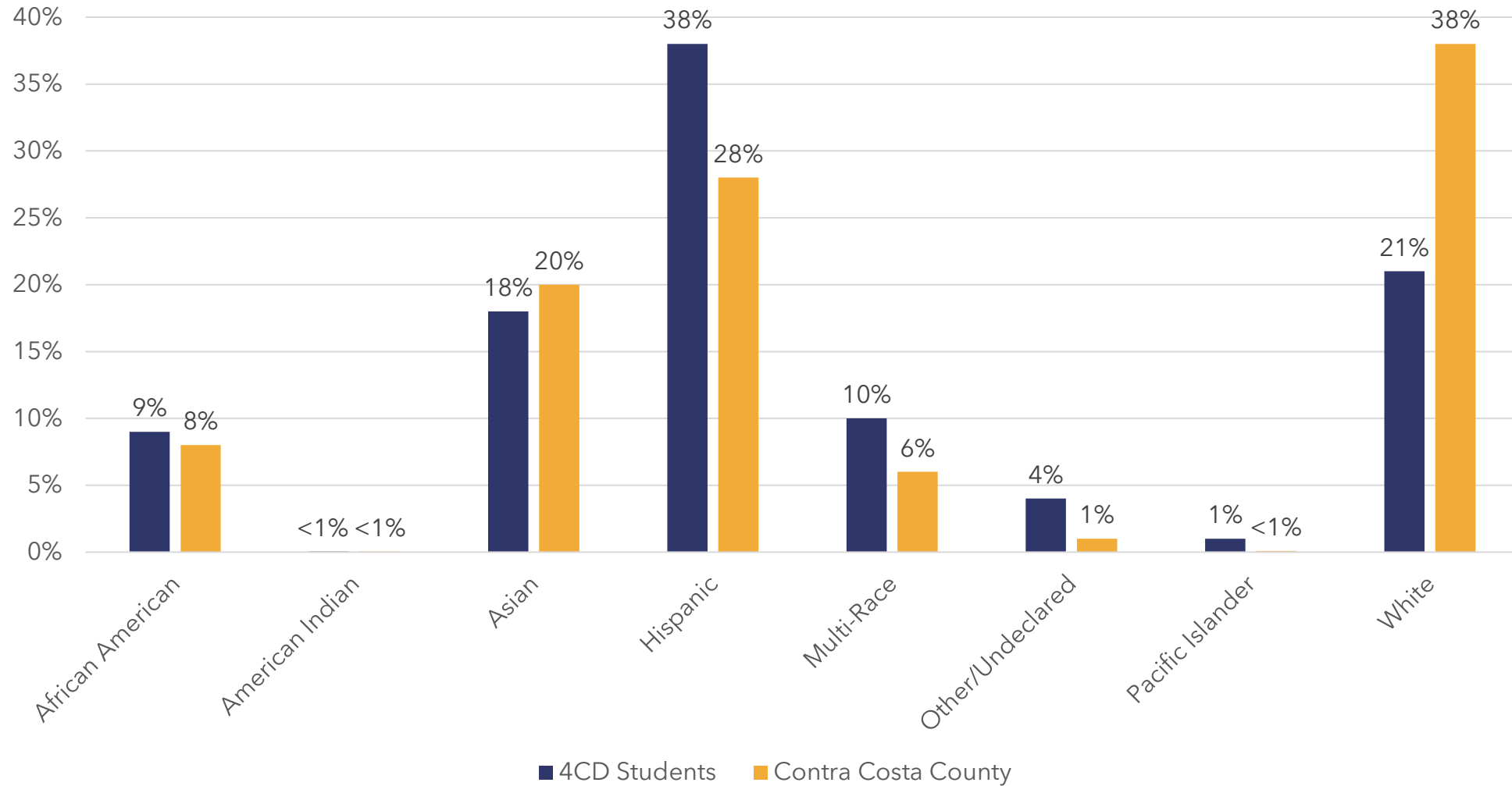

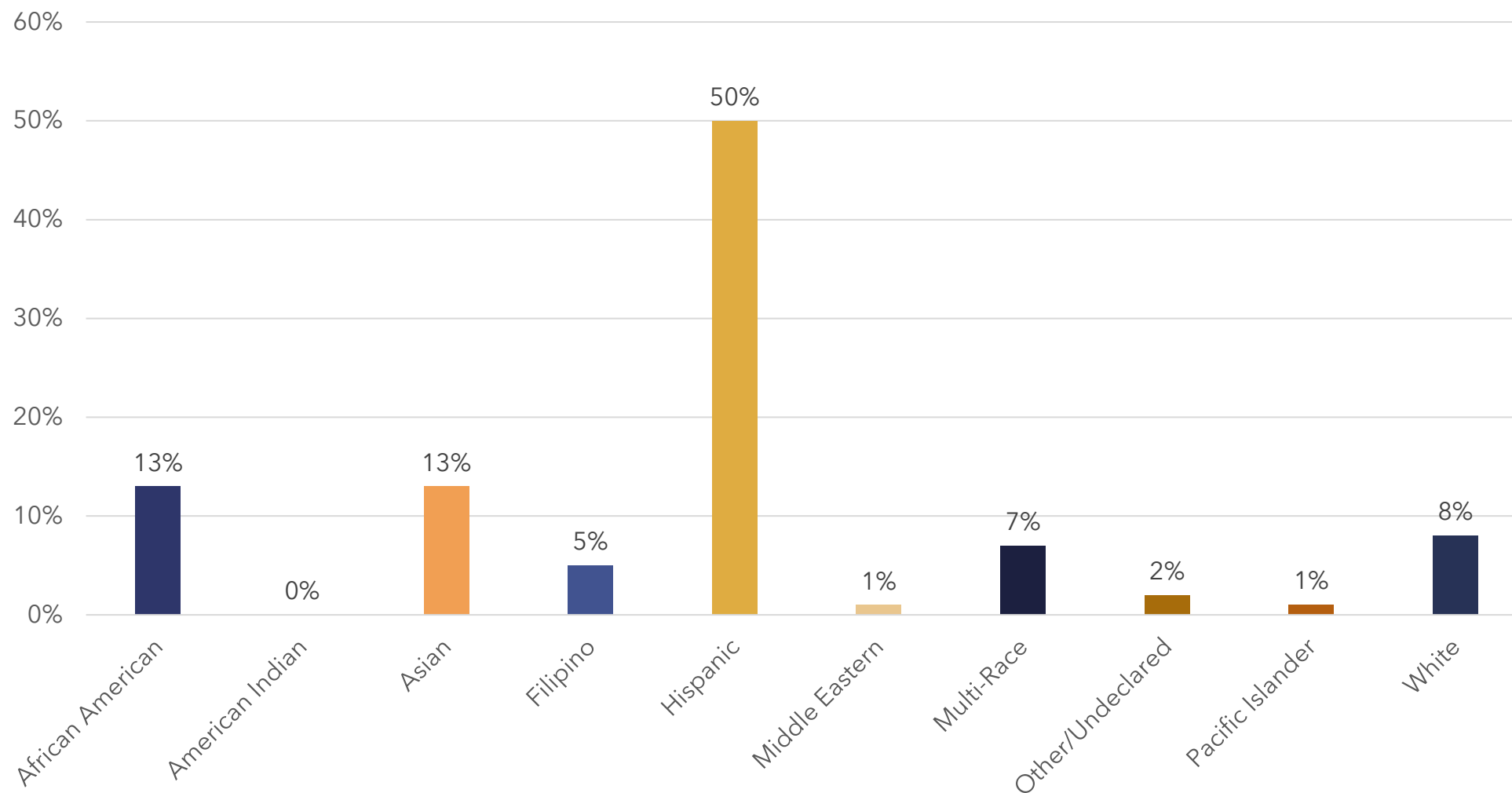

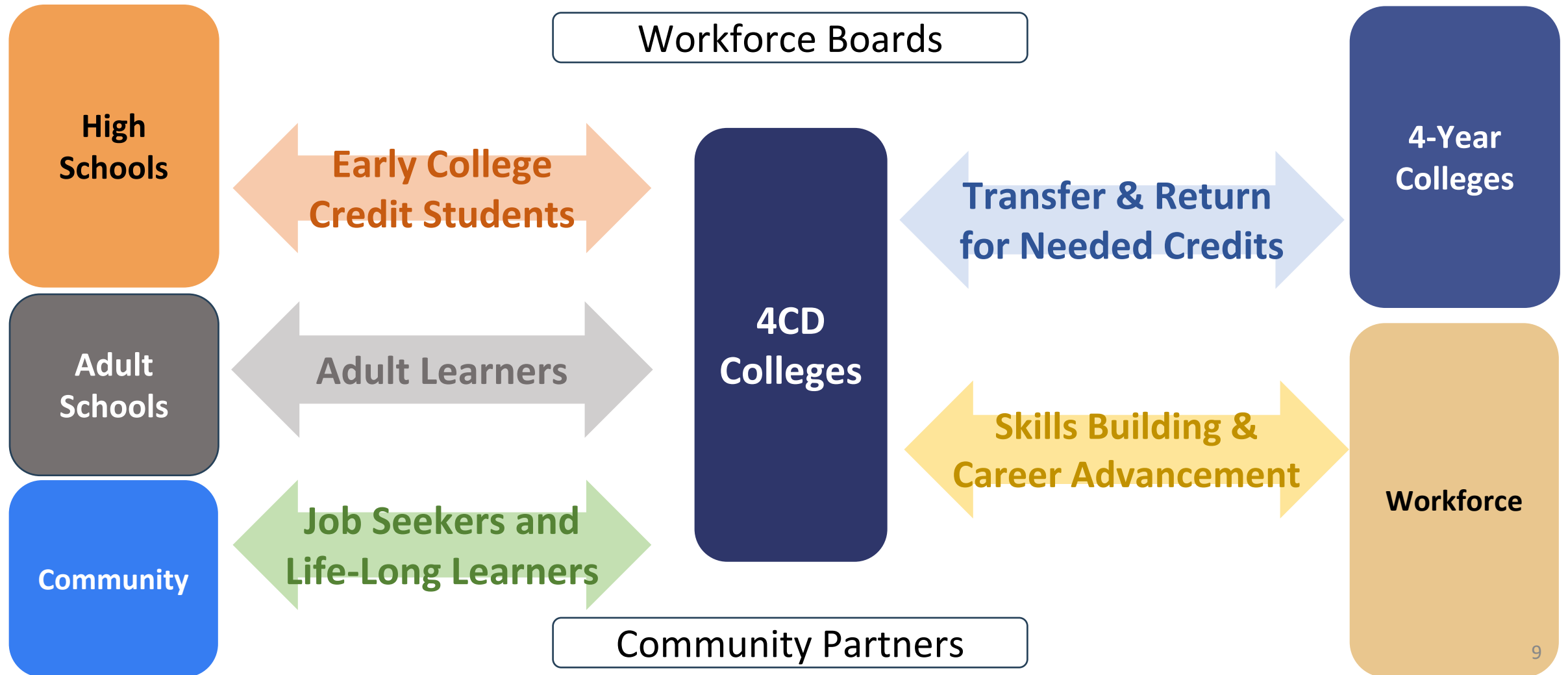

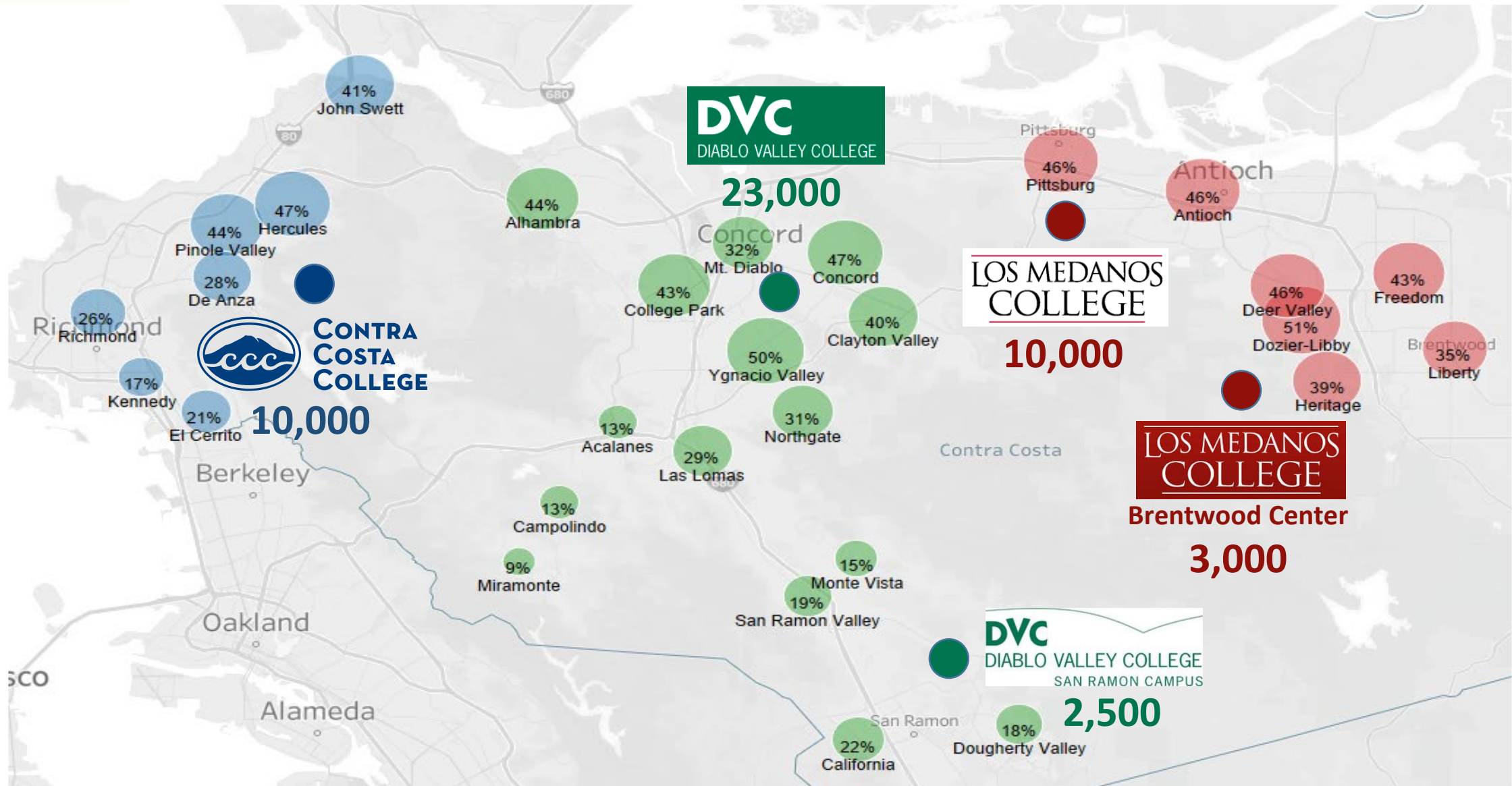

Strong Fiscal Health: Financial Highlights

- \$267.5 million annual budget
- Board required reserve of at least two months of operating expenses
 - 2025-26 unrestricted reserves of \$52.3 million or 19.5% of expenditure budget
 - Continued clean audit findings for District operations and bond measures

Bond Issuance & Financial Stewardship

- 2014 Measure E is approximately 90% spent
- Final \$110 million authorization was sold in 2022
- Strong Bond Rating of AA+ (S&P) and Aa1 (Moody's)
- The District refinanced prior bond sales (\$402M) as a measure of fiscal stewardship, successfully saving taxpayers \$44 million



Aging Facilities, Continued Need

- Infrastructure and buildings are 50+ years old
- Facilities need repairs or replacement
- Technology is insufficient to meet evolving needs
- Flexible spaces and state-of-the-art equipment are required to help students prepare for in-demand careers



Potential Future Bond

- Reviewing facilities plans for each college
- Prioritizing projects
- Seeking community input
- Governing Board considering general obligation bond for June 2026
