- Assists with risk-management and claims against the city


New Technology

Significant Cases

On July 31, 2024, at approximately 8:34 PM, a Hercules Police Department Officer conducted a traffic enforcement stop in the 800 block of Willow Avenue. During the contact, the officer located suspected narcotics, which led to a probable cause search of the vehicle. The search resulted in the discovery of a fully loaded mini Draco short-barreled rifle equipped with a 30-round magazine. The driver was subsequently arrested on firearms and narcotics-related charges.



Significant Cases

On February 25, 2025, at approximately 5:00 PM, HPD Officers located a stolen vehicle in the 1500 block of Sycamore Avenue. As officers attempted to recover the vehicle, the driver fled and collided with an HPD patrol car. While no pursuit was initiated, a police helicopter tracked the suspect vehicle into Oakland, where it was later abandoned. Follow-up investigation led to the identification of a suspect. HPD officers subsequently served a search and arrest warrant at the suspect's residence, uncovering a largescale identity theft and fraud operation. The suspect was arrested, and officers recovered over 500 blank checks, printers and laminating machines, 20 counterfeit California driver's licenses, several passports, and various other materials associated with identity theft.






Community Engagement Youth Police Academy
