Lead Staff: Christopher Roke, Parks & Recreation Director

Description: The Parks and Recreation Department leads and/or is involved with many community activities and events all year long. We also collect fees for various classes and services provided to the community.

Status: In January 2020 the department brought in **\$123,907.44** in revenue. Year to Date Revenue for Fiscal Year 2019-20 is **\$914,223.48**. Tracking ahead of the last year.

Project/Program: Community & Library Services Commission
Lead Staff: Christopher Roke, Parks & Recreation Director

Description: The Community and Library Services Commission was dark in August. September through November were busy months with presentations from the 14 City recognized Nonprofit groups. Applications for the 2020FY were due in November, and the Commission voted on applications at the December meeting.

Status: The Commission spent time updating the Nonprofit renewal packet for City Recognized Nonprofit groups in 2017 & 2018. The biggest change in 2018 was the addition of the 1099 Tax form for each group. In addition, the Commission reviewed the banner program and got to see the completion of the west side parks improvements project. The City recognized nonprofit





organizations will participate in upcoming events like the 2nd annual Trunk or Treat event, Tree Lighting and the Citywide Clean-up Day.

Accomplishments/Items in Progress:

- December 1, held annual Tree Lighting event at the Community Swim Center.

Project/Program: Hanna/Lupine/Ohlone Childcare & Summer Day Camps

Lead Staff: Ambra Garfield, Recreation Manager

Description: Childcare and Camps are a big deal in Hercules. We offer a great before school option called "Breakfast Club", and an amazing after school program called "Kaleidoscope Kidz: Recreation Afterschool Program (or RAP for short), and fantastic summer camps called "Camp Firecracker" and "Camp Dynamite".

Camp Dynamite: was held at the Lupine Kidz Center summer 2019 while Hanna Ranch received some much needed attention. Highlights from Summer 2019 include 9 weeks of camp featuring weekly entertainment, field trips, games, cooking, arts and crafts, weekly themes, swimming, Jamin' Jeanne's games galore and more. Camp was split in to 2 age groups with Firecrackers (grades K-2nd) and Dynamite (grades 3rd-5th). Dynamite campers went on 4 big field trips along with the Teen Dynamite Camp. Camp averaged between 75-80 campers each week.

- Camp will return to Hanna Ranch Kidz Center in 2020 after a facelift in summer 2019.
- Plans are underway for summer 2020, with more trips and activities.
- We are adding a weekly Camp Sparklers Camp for preschool age campers.

Breakfast Club: features earlier hours (open 6:30am), and breakfast (hot or cold food & drink options - available for purchase). Parents (and participants) love the program for the convenience! This is part of our concierge service to the community. This fall, we opened another site, offering Breakfast Club at Ohlone Community Center. The trend has shown us that we needed more space for Ohlone kids. By opening Ohlone Community Center, we are able to increase the number of participants. It also allows us to stay later at the Breakfast Club site, which is reducing the number of staff needed in the morning.

Kaleidoscope Kidz: Recreation Afterschool Program (or RAP for short), is our after school program. After a successful rebranding of the after school program, the focus has become more about homework, and stations. The stations include P.E. to keep the kidz active. RAP focuses on monthly themes that featured a combination of arts and crafts, science, cooking, passive and active games and much more. RAP is held at all 3 elementary sites. The current challenge that we face for all of our programs is our lack of staffing. We have very few spaces available for the Rap program. Two of our Afterschool programs are full with waiting lists.

Status: In January Child Care programs brought in a total of \$55,960.72in revenue.

Accomplishments/Items in Progress:

- The new school year programs are already getting impacted and we still have 3 weeks until school begins.
 - August has become one of our largest months for enrollment and revenue and we anticipate the same thing this year.
- Another successful summer with the Camp program. Camp Firecracker and Camp Dynamite numbers are up a little compared to last summer.

Project/Program: Tiny Tots Programs-Little Learners/Pre-Kinder/Jr. Kinder

Lead Staff: Ambra Garfield, Recreation Manager

Description: Our Tiny Tots Program introduces children to their "First Learning Experiences". They make their first school friends, learn through play, games, arts, crafts and healthy snacks. Our qualified staff guide them with socialization and self-help skills. The program runs concurrent with the school year from late August through June. Tiny Tots began at the end of August.

Status: In January Tiny Tot Programs brought in \$19,930.50 in revenue.

- Preschool Holiday programs were a big success, followed by a 2 week break.
- December brought several drops for a variety of reasons. Most of the drops were families moving out of Hercules and had multiple children in classes. However, there are still folks on the waitlist and staff is working on filling the newly open spaces.
- 10/25 participated in Trunk or Treat event.
- 10/23 held Unity Day activities. Anti-bullying campaign about inclusion & acceptance.
- The Hanna Preschool children are enjoying the new improved play area.
 - The blacktop has a new bike path, hopscotch, foursquare and basketball hoops.
 - o There are also two new pieces of play equipment for their age group.
 - o And 15 new Big Wheels for the children to drive in the new pathway.
- Hanna Ranch Improvement project started with phase 1 end of January.
- Hanna Preschool had been dealing with a flea problem in September and October. After trying a myriad of things, we believe the issue has been resolved.
- Numbers increased in the LL and PK classes. Both started low, but now only 1 spot left.
- Good news/bad news: the new Aide that started in October, is leaving due to a family emergency. We continue to struggle to keep staff.
- Like child care, preschool picked up as the calendar hit August.
- Added additional classes in anticipation of growing program.

Project/Program: Aquatics

Lead Staff: Damian Sandholm - Recreation Coordinator

Description: The Aquatics program encompasses a lot of different programs, from seasonal swim lessons, to lap swimming, water walking, rec swim, lifeguarding courses, and of course Swim and Water Polo Teams including: the East Bay Silver Dolphins (EBSD), the Piranhas, and Hercules High School Swim and Water Polo teams.

Status: In January Aquatics brought in \$7,057.00 in revenue.
