



Project/Program:Parks & Recreation Department ActivitiesLead Staff:Christopher Roke, Parks & Recreation Director

Description: The Parks and Recreation Department leads and/or is involved with many community activities and events all year long. We also collect fees for various classes and services provided to the community.

Status: In November 2017 the department brought in \$87,094.03 in revenue. Year to Date Revenue for Fiscal Year 2017-18 is **\$650,233.44**. Overall, revenue is trending up from the previous FY. Part of the increase is reflective of bigger numbers in the Summer Camps, Swim Lessons, the revised structure to our youth programs in particular the rebranding of our before and after school programs and additional classes added to the Tiny Tot program.

Accomplishments/Items in Progress:

- The Winter/Spring Activity Guide arrived in November.
- The Winter/Spring Activity Guide was mailed to every household November 15.
- The 2nd Annual Social Bite event was held at the Bayfront, on Saturday, September 16. Highlights included 20+ food trucks & vendors, merchants, entertainment and a car show. Overall the event was a huge success with an estimated 4,000 (+/-) people.
- Summer camps did extremely well this year with increased numbers in Camp Dynamite. However, we were unable to accommodate everyone because of a staffing shortage.
- The Fall Activity Guide received great feedback, and covered September December.
- City Council approved the 2017-18FY budget at the June 27, Public Hearing, which means lots of enhancements are coming to our department over the course of the 2017-18FY.
 - \circ $\,$ 1 of the 2 new 15-passenger vans arrived in September.
 - The 2nd van is scheduled to arrive in February 2018.
 - New pool covers are expected to arrive any day.
 - New equipment for family movie nights in the park are on order. Our first movie with the new equipment will be May 4, 2018, as part of a collaborative partnership with the Library and Bayfront Chamber of Commerce. The event will be "May the Fourth Be With You". 3 very successful movie nights were held at Refugio Park in 2016-17.
- Child care has been overhauled for the 2017-18 school year. Part of rebranding efforts for the before and after school programs. More info to follow.
- New and improved Rec Expo Week format was a hit in 2017. We will keep it the same for 2018. The dates of Rec Expo Week are April 23-26, 2018.

Project/Program:Community & Library Services CommissionLead Staff:Christopher Roke, Parks & Recreation Director

Description: The Community and Library Services Commission provides information to and advises the City Council on items related to the City's library, recreation, parks, and community services programs, including the general use of park facilities and matters relating to the community's recreational and service needs.





Status: The Commission spent time in 2017 updating the Nonprofit renewal packet for City Recognized Nonprofit groups. In addition, the Commission spent time last year working on community outreach regarding the west side parks improvements project, input for the Library's tenth anniversary celebration, a permanent display space at the Hercules Library for the Hercules Historical Society, mural preservation, City recognized nonprofit organizations, continual evaluation of Parks & Recreation Programs, the Citywide Clean-up Day and approval of new plaques for the heritage garden.

Accomplishments/Items in Progress:

- The annual Tree Lighting event will be held Sunday, December 3.
- The Citywide Clean-up Day for 2018 has been confirmed for Saturday, May 5, 2018.
 - In 2017 there were more than 250 vehicles came through the gates filling up 14 large dumpsters in the Corp Yard. There were 105 volunteers that gave their time to the event, not only at the yard, but at several parks and the Refugio Valley Trail as well.
 - We are in the process of securing the dumpsters for next year. There is a conflict with the Cinco de Mayo event in San Pablo. So we will have to look for additional dumpsters.

Project/Program:Hanna/Lupine/Ohlone Childcare & Summer Day CampsLead Staff:Ambra Garfield, Recreation Manager

Description: As mentioned above, the Before and After School programs were overhauled for the 2017-18FY.

The **Breakfast Club** has been an instant hit! Opening at 6:30am with breakfast options has the parents (and participants) extremely happy. The program is held at the Teen center. Parents have inquired about adding a drop-in option in the morning, but we just don't have the space at this time. Especially for two of the Kidz Centers (Lupine and Hanna are full) and the third Kidz Center (Ohlone) is also almost full. Breakfast Club has to limit participants based on the number of seats in our Vans, and available staff.

The after school Child Care program has been rebranded as well and is now "**Kaleidoscope Kidz**, a **Recreation Afterschool Program**" (or RAP for short). Part of the rebranding includes a greater focus on homework, and a station rotation curriculum with P.E. to make sure that our kidz are active. The themes change each month with a different State and theme to direct the Activity Plan for each classroom. Staff bring in wonderful arts and crafts, science and cooking projects. The RAP staff seem to run out of time daily, trying to find the right balance of homework time and fun time! The RAP program is held at each of the 3 elementary sites, but the facilities have also changed their names to "Kidz Center", to compliment the name change to Kaleidoscope Kidz.





Status: In November 2017 Child Care programs brought in a total of **\$39,418.04** in revenue. There are a total of 121 children in Kaleidoscope Kidz compared to 99 last year. And 44 in the Breakfast Club compared to 39 the Early Bird (Before School) program last year. Limited space is still available in both the morning and afterschool programs.

Accomplishments/Items in Progress:

- The Lupine Kidz Center outside playground surface needs to be repaired. A combination of little rain for many years, and the extreme rain last year, has allowed movement of the base dirt under the surface causing uneven and unsafe areas.
 - In the meantime, staff will take the children to the adjoining Woodfield Park or the school yard until repairs can be made.
- The daily schedules at Lupine, Hanna and Ohlone Kidz Centers are working out well.
- We are still looking for staff to work the afternoon shifts in our RAP program from 2:00-5:45pm.
- The Lupine Kidz Center was remodeled this past summer. A new coat of paint, tree trimming, stump grinding, concrete grinding, and more.
- The new Breakfast Club program at the teen center has increase the enrollment numbers at the Ohlone Kidz Center by about 9 children this year. Families really like the early opening of 6:30am and breakfast option.
- The lupine/Hanna Kidz Center RAP have increased their enrollment numbers since start of school. Lupine has only three spots left and Hanna has one spot left.
- The Ohlone Kidz Center opened a new room this school year and we now have full enrollment of 43 children in the RAP. We currently have a waiting list at the Ohlone site.
- All three Kidz Centers celebrated Unity Day October 25, 2017. This day about stopping bullying and support kindness, inclusion and acceptance.

Project/Program:Tiny Tots Programs-Little Learners/Pre-Kinder/Jr. KinderLead Staff:Ambra Garfield, Recreation Manager

Description: The Tiny Tots Programs introduce children to their "First Learning Experiences". They make their first school friends, learning through play, games, arts, crafts and healthy snacks. Our qualified staff will guide them with socialization and self-help skills. The program runs





concurrent with the school year from late August through June. Tiny Tots began August 28 and 29, 2017.

Status: In November 2017 Tiny Tot Programs brought in **\$14,977.59** in revenue. Tiny Tots – November 2017 enrollment is closing in on 100 participants compared to 85 last year.

Accomplishments/Items in Progress:

- Preschool all about discovering your classroom environment, as well as developing socially and emotionally. The preschoolers are learning through play but with an academic component, called Discovery Centers.
- Preschooler are enjoying sensory tubs in each class. These sensory tubs coordinate with the monthly theme and work on several skills. Sensory develop helps with the hand-eye coordination, solving problems and math concepts. The children really enjoy them and learn through play!
- November and December preschooler are reviewing concepts they have been learning.
- Staff is starting to work on progress reports that will go out the first week of January.
- Tiny Tots began Monday, August 28 or Tuesday, August 29, depending on which class you are in (M,W,F or Tu/Th).
- A new Pre-Kinder class was added at the Lupine Kidz Center this year and that class is full.
- The Multi-Age class, Little Learner 3 year old class and the Jr. Kinder class were all full before the start of the 2017-18 school year.
- Our biggest need is custodial. This is something that will be pushed in the next budget cycle.
- The key for us is to stay current on Preschool curriculum and keep bringing and building upon new ideas and events for families to enjoy.
 - We are looking into bring in music and Spanish in the future.
- In addition, we are planning to bring new pre-kinder programs to the sites in the Winter. Stay tuned for more new programming for Hercules families.

Project/Program:AquaticsLead Staff:Austin George, Recreation Coordinator

Description: Lessons have ended for the 2017 year. Summer and Fall Swim Lessons were a hit. The Hercules High School Water Polo wrapped up their season. Hercules High School Principal, Paul Mansingh, praised City staff citing the facility being the catalyst to a resurgence of the Titan Water Polo program. According to Mr. Mansingh, the team tripled in size and popularity this year. The main reason cited was the proximity to the school. We plan to build on this relationship for years to come.

Status: In November 2017 Aquatics brought in \$4,521.75 in revenue.
