



Project/Program: Parks & Recreation Department Activities
Lead Staff: Christopher Roke, Parks & Recreation Director

Description: The Parks and Recreation Department leads and/or is involved with many community activities and events all year long. We also collect fees for various classes and services provided to the community.

Status: In June 2019 the department brought in **\$162,029.44** in revenue. Year to Date Revenue for Fiscal Year 2018-19 is **\$1,740,215.25**. Almost identical to last Fiscal Year 2017-18.

Project/Program: Community & Library Services Commission
Lead Staff: Christopher Roke, Parks & Recreation Director

Description: The Community and Library Services Commission renewed Nonprofit groups applications for the 2019CY in December 2018 and January 2019. Renewal packets were due in December. Annual reports from the Nonprofit groups were heard September, October and November. The Commission went dark in August.





Status: The Commission spent time updating the Nonprofit renewal packet for City Recognized Nonprofit groups in 2017 & 2018. The biggest change in 2018 was the addition of the 1099 Tax form for each group. In addition, the Commission spent over the past year working on community outreach regarding the west side parks improvements project, input for the Library's tenth anniversary celebration, a permanent display space at the Hercules Library for the Hercules Historical Society, mural preservation, City recognized nonprofit organizations, continual evaluation of Parks & Recreation Programs, the Citywide Clean-up Day and approval of new plaques for the heritage garden.

Accomplishments/Items in Progress:

- May 4, marked the annual Community Clean-up Day at the Corp Yard. 196 vehicles (residents) took advantage of this opportunity (compared to 216 in 2018).
- Saturday, April 27: held successful Ribbon Cutting event for Duck Pond Park project.
- February, Duck Pond Park Amenities project pending contractor punch list.
 - New bathroom, ½ basketball court, benches, fencing and landscaping are done.
 - A ceremony is pending the contractor punch list completion.
 - A tour will be scheduled for the Commission soon.
- December 2018, Holiday Tree Lighting event success! 600+ to see Mr. and Mrs. Claus.
- October 2018, Trunk or Treat event at CSC drew 200+. Great event will hold again 2019.

Project/Program: Hanna/Lupine/Ohlone Childcare & Summer Day Camps

Description: Childcare and Camps are a big deal in Hercules. We offer a great before school option called "Breakfast Club", and an amazing after school program called "Kaleidoscope Kidz: Recreation Afterschool Program (or RAP for short), and fantastic summer camps called "Camp Firecracker" and "Camp Dynamite".

This summer Camp will be held at the Lupine Kidz Center. There are going to be 9 total weeks of camp. Camp will run from June 12 to August 9. Camp will feature weekly entertainment, field trips, games, cooking, arts and crafts, weekly themes, swimming, Jamin' Jeanne's games galore and more.

Camp will be split in to 2 age groups with Firecrackers (grades K-2nd) and Dynamite (grades 3rd-5th). Dynamite campers will attend 4 off site field trips along with the Teen Dynamite summer camp group. Below are a few highlights coming up this summer as well as a week by week glance of the numbers to date...

- Outside Entertainment for 9 weeks.
- Four bus field trips with Camp Dynamite (grades 3-5).
- Every Tuesday/Thursday became swim days at the Community Swim Center from 1-4p.
- Camp Firecracker 2nd grade class every Monday walked to the Hercules library for story and check out books.

Breakfast Club has been a hit since we started the program at the beginning of 2017-18. Breakfast Club features earlier hours (opening at 6:30a), and breakfast options (hot and cold food/drink options available for purchase). Parents (and participants) love the program! Using the Teen Center instead of the schools allowed the City to cut back the number of staff necessary to run the morning and after school programs which also saved the City money.

Kaleidoscope Kidz: Recreation Afterschool Program (or RAP for short), is our after school program. After a successful rebranded of the after school program, the focus has become greater on homework, and stations. The stations include P.E. to make sure the kidz are active. RAP focuses on monthly themes that featured a combination of arts and crafts, science, cooking, passive and active games and much more. RAP is held at all 3 elementary sites. The current challenge that we face for all of our programs is our lack of staffing. We have very few spaces available for the Rap program. Two of our Afterschool programs are full with waiting lists.

Status: In June Child Care programs brought in a total of \$9,853.31 in revenue.





Accomplishments/Items in Progress:

- The month of June will be a busy one for the Hanna Kidz Center. The majority of the work will be done on site as part of the Hanna Ranch Improvements project, which is one of the Decision packages the Council approved as part of the 2018-19 Budget.
 - We anticipate the decks to be demolished, dry rot repairs to be completed, a new deck and ramp system constructed between the classrooms and off the back door entrance to the office, painting of the entire facility, and more.
- The next phases are being scheduled. Demo of deck, painting all 5 buildings, and new deck with ramps will all begin to commence after school gets out for summer (6/7/19).
- Phase 1 of the Hanna Ranch Improvements is complete. This is part of Decision Package #19-12. The office ramp was replaced, a door was closed up permanently. Inside, the door opening was turned into a new chalkboard area for the kids in Tiny Tots and RAP.
- Each Kidz Center now has a new Leader III-Director. These two positions were filled by two office assistance II who applied for the positions. Both of these ladies have been working at the Kidz centers for many years. It's worked out great for them and the families that know them so well. We are excited for this great opportunity for them.
- Child Care is enjoying an increase in enrollment for the 2018-19 school year.
 - o Lupine has a waiting list. We were able to open an additional class of TK/K.
- The new school year saw an increase in last minute Child Care registration.
 - o In August, we had one of our largest months ever with enrollment and revenue.
- Camp Dynamite has been successful this summer. The numbers are comparable to last summer when we increased enrollment, and this is without the 5th graders. We moved the 5th graders into the Teen Camp program to accommodate the youngest age group that exploded this past FY.

Project/Program: Tiny Tots Programs-Little Learners/Pre-Kinder/Jr. Kinder

Lead Staff: Ambra Garfield, Recreation Manager

Description: Our Tiny Tots Program introduces children to their "First Learning Experiences". They make their first school friends, learn through play, games, arts, crafts and healthy snacks. Our qualified staff guide them with socialization and self-help skills. The program runs concurrent with the school year from late August through June. Tiny Tots began at the end of August.

Status: In June Tiny Tot Programs brought in **\$2,414.67** in revenue.

Accomplishments/Items in Progress:

Held Preschool graduations the last week in May.





- Progress Reports went out the last week of May. It was very rewarding for staff to see how much the Preschool schoolers accomplished this year.
- Hanna Ranch Improvement project started with phase 1 end of January.
- Hanna Preschool had been dealing with a flea problem in September and October. After trying a myriad of things, we believe the issue has been resolved.
- Numbers increased in the LL and PK classes. Both started low, but now only 1 spot left.
- Good news/bad news: the new Aide that started in October, is leaving due to a family emergency. We continue to struggle to keep staff.
- Like child care, preschool picked up as the calendar hit August.
- Added additional classes in anticipation of growing program.

Project/Program: Aquatics

Lead Staff: Damian Sandholm - Recreation Coordinator

Description: The Aquatics program encompasses a lot of different programs, from seasonal swim lessons, to lap swimming, water walking, rec swim, lifeguarding courses, and of course Swim and Water Polo Teams including: the East Bay Silver Dolphins (EBSD), the Piranhas, and Hercules High School Swim and Water Polo teams.

Status: In June Aquatics brought in \$40,913.12 in revenue.

- Summer staff training was a success. Staff is excited for the upcoming summer.
- Hercules Piranhas Swim Team began hosting swim meets at the Swim Center.
- Lifeguard Training class was completed on May 25. Five of the eight participants are in the hiring process to work for the City of Hercules.
- Hercules Piranhas Swim Team began practice for the 2019 Season on April 29.
- Belly Flops with Cops Event was held on April 13. There were 14 participants in the Belly Flop Competition.
- Damian Sandholm started on February 25 as the new Recreation Coordinator to oversee Aquatic Programs, Senior Center operations, and Recreation classes.
- Hercules High School Swim Team began the season on January 28.





- Interviews for the vacant Coordinator position took place in January. We hope to have a new Coordinator on board by the end of February, or the start of March.
- Recreation Coordinator, Austin George took new job with the City of Dixon.
- Rough stretch late November/early December combination of the Camp Fire,
 Thanksgiving break, and the pump in the main pool heater going down, meant the pool
 was vacant for a while. Fortunately we were able to make the repairs and get everyone
 back in the water.
- Harnoor Deol, of Troop 113, built and donated 4 picnic tables to the Aquatics program.
 This was part of his Eagle project. The City is always appreciative of the community involvement.
- Hercules High School Water Polo finished their season October 26. The girls team made a significant improvement coming up one win shy of making the NCS Playoffs.
- In September, we completed the installation of the (2) Variable Frequency Drives (or VFD's) on the pool pumps. This will save the City lots of money over the course of the next decade, allowing the pumps to operate at a fraction of their output when no one is using the pool. This was a part of the Council approved Decision Packages for 2018-19FY.
- New swim lesson format has been a hit this summer. Lots of positive feedback.
- Another successful Piranhas season here at the Community Swim Center.

Project/Program: Recreation Classes

Description: The department has been working to find new contract class instructors to help increase the variety of programs, as well as the quality of programs that the community has become accustomed to. Our recreation classes cater to all ages and help to promote a healthy lifestyle. Our classes vary season to season. We hope you will give them a try.

Project/Program: Senior Center

Description: The Senior Center averages approximately 150-200 members annually. Friends, food, fun and companionship is what the Hercules Senior Center is all about. We strive to ensure a physically and emotionally comfortable environment for all, and encourage socialization with peers. One of the biggest changes for 2018-19 is that the City will no longer be able to keep the revenue generated from CC Café lunch program.

Status: In June the Senior Center brought in **\$1,275.00** in revenue.

Project/Program: Teen/Youth

Description: As our youth grow into teens, we want to give them a sense of ownership and belonging to the community. The programs and activities at the Teen Center promote these very same goals. The Teen Youth Council (T.Y.C.) has transitioned to a new Junior Staff In Training program. The JSIT program is all about preparing teens to enter the work force. JSIT participants will assist and support the staff with Community activities and Special Events. This energetic group of 6th-12th graders demonstrate leadership skills through their participation at City Council meetings, interaction with the Hercules Senior Center, and the planning of Teen/Youth Special occasions. This successful program recruits active members from the Hercules Community and the Hercules Middle and High School.

Status: In June, the Teen Center brought in \$17,662.10 in revenue.

- Teen Dynamite Summer Camp began on Wednesday, June 12th.
 - Campers will enjoy (2) field trips a week, swimming at the Community Center, group games, cooking projects, video games, pool, ping pong, air hockey, movies, and most importantly, making memories with their new and old friends!
- 6 Jr SIT participants were hired for Summer Camp as Aides. The program is paying off big as we cultivate our own staff. We are all looking forward to seeing what these Aides can bring to the program this summer.
- The Jr SIT program ran the annual EGGstravaganza at the Sr. Center. This year the Seniors were involved with each station: egg decorating, basket decorating, cookie decorating, bunny crunch, and more.
 - The Jr SIT staff handled the egg hunt and face painting duties among other things.
- Started a brand new program called Junior Staff in Training this Fall. The Jr SIT program is designed for teens in the 9th through 12th grades. The goal for this program is to develop





life and professional skills to prepare them for their first jobs. With completion of this program, they may have an opportunity to apply for a vacant position here in the City of Hercules.

• Successfully transitioned 5th graders into Teen Dynamite Summer Camp. This increased the numbers and revenue for Teen Camp and the Teen program for the year.

Project/Program: Facilities/Rentals

Description: The City of Hercules offers many of the City's facilities for rent when not being used for City sponsored programs or services. Facility attendants also prepare facilities for the department's classes and city meetings.

Status: In June, facility rentals brought in \$19,868.75 in revenue.
