Description: The Parks and Recreation Department leads and/or is involved with many community activities and events all year long. We also collect fees for various classes and services provided to the community.

Status: In July 2019 the department brought in **\$179,851.16** in revenue. *Compared to* \$145,855.61 last Fiscal Year 2018-19.

Project/Program: Community & Library Services Commission

Description: The Community and Library Services Commission went dark in August. But September through November will be busy months with presentations from the 14 City recognized Nonprofit groups. Applications for the 2020FY will also be due in November, and the Commission will vote on applications at the December meeting.

Status: The Commission spent time updating the Nonprofit renewal packet for City Recognized Nonprofit groups in 2017 & 2018. The biggest change in 2018 was the addition of the 1099 Tax form for each group. In addition, the Commission reviewed the banner program and got to see the completion of the west side parks improvements project. The City recognized nonprofit organizations will participate in upcoming events like the 2nd annual Trunk or Treat event, Tree Lighting and the Citywide Clean-up Day.

Project/Program: Hanna/Lupine/Ohlone Childcare & Summer Day Camps

Description: Childcare and Camps are a big deal in Hercules. We offer a great before school option called "Breakfast Club", and an amazing after school program called "Kaleidoscope Kidz: Recreation Afterschool Program (or RAP for short), and fantastic summer camps called "Camp Firecracker" and "Camp Dynamite".

This summer Camp is being held at the Lupine Kidz Center. We have already completed 8 of the 9 weeks of camp. Camp highlights include weekly entertainment, field trips, games, cooking, arts and crafts, weekly themes, swimming, Jamin' Jeanne's games galore and more.

Camp is split in to 2 age groups: Firecrackers (grades K-2nd) and Dynamite (grades 3rd-5th). Dynamite campers will attend 4 off site field trips along with the Teen Dynamite summer camp group. Below are a few highlights from this summer as well as a week by week glance of the numbers to date...

- Outside Entertainment for 9 weeks.
- Four bus field trips with Camp Dynamite (grades 3-5).
- Every Tuesday/Thursday became swim days at the Community Swim Center from 1-4p.
- Camp Firecracker 2nd grade class every Monday walked to the Hercules library for story and check out books.

Status: In July Summer Camps brought in a total of \$44,747.35 in revenue.

Breakfast Club became an instant hit since its inception in 2017-18. Breakfast Club features earlier hours (opening at 6:30a), and breakfast (hot or cold food & drink options - available for purchase). Parents (and participants) love the program for the convenience! This is part of our concierge service to the community.





This fall we plan to open a second Breakfast Club site to address the growing need at Ohlone Elementary. One of the things we are looking to address is the total number of participants. Holding the program at the Teen Center we are limited to the number of seats in our vans. And with 2 vans we have to leave early to get to all 3 sites on time. That means we have to have staff on school sites when we drop the participants. So this is an item we are addressing this fall. Stay tuned for next month's report.

Kaleidoscope Kidz: Recreation Afterschool Program (or RAP for short), is our after school program. After a successful rebranding of the after school program, the focus has become more about homework, and stations. The stations include P.E. to keep the kidz active. RAP focuses on monthly themes that featured a combination of arts and crafts, science, cooking, passive and active games and much more. RAP is held at all 3 elementary sites. The current challenge that we face for all of our programs is our lack of staffing. Space is already filling up, and will be limited by the time school begins in August.

Status: In July Child Care programs brought in a total of \$54,410.32 in revenue.

Accomplishments/Items in Progress:

- The new school year programs are already getting impacted and we still have 3 weeks until school begins.
 - August has become one of our largest months for enrollment and revenue and we anticipate the same thing this year.
- Another successful summer with the Camp program. Camp Firecracker and Camp Dynamite numbers are up a little compared to last summer.

Project/Program: Tiny Tots Programs-Little Learners/Pre-Kinder/Jr. Kinder

Description: Our Tiny Tots Program introduces children to their "First Learning Experiences". They make their first school friends, learn through play, games, arts, crafts and healthy snacks. Our qualified staff guide them with socialization and self-help skills. The program runs concurrent with the school year from late August through June. Tiny Tots will begin August 27 & 28.

Status: In July Tiny Tot Programs brought in \$13,463.87 in revenue.

The Teen Youth Council (T.Y.C.) has transitioned to a new Junior Staff In Training program. The JSIT program is all about preparing teens to enter the work force. JSIT participants will assist and support the staff with Community activities and Special Events. This energetic group of 6th-12th graders demonstrate leadership skills through their participation at City Council meetings, interaction with the Hercules Senior Center, and the planning of Teen/Youth Special occasions. This successful program recruits active members from the Hercules Community and the Hercules Middle and High School.
